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# Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company Presents *The Nosebleed* — written, directed, and featuring Aya Ogawa — March 31 - April 23, 2023

(Washington DC) Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company explores family trauma, failure, and forgiveness as it presents the regional premiere of <u>The Nosebleed</u>. Written, directed, and featuring Aya Ogawa, *The Nosebleed* is an intimate portrait of Ogawa's fractured relationship with their long-deceased father and their haunting regret. *The Nosebleed* runs March 31-April 23 at Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company. "It's true to Woolly to support art and artists who don't necessarily start from a script, but rather work in a generative collaborative process that often pushes the artform forward," says **Maria Manuela Goyanes**, Woolly's Artistic Director. "This devised piece about Aya Ogawa's relationship with her father explores inherited grief and failure in off-the-wall funny ways, blending pop culture with her personal story. Plus, you won't want to miss the unexpected appearance by a beloved historical figure come back to life."

Through a series of turbulent, absurd, and dark, comical autobiographical vignettes, Aya Ogawa's *The Nosebleed* explores the cultural and generational gap between themselves and their father, and the questions they face in their own motherhood today. Five different "Ayas" take the audience on a theatrical memorial and healing ritual, asking them to consider the complexities of love, family obligation, and what it takes to forgive.

"The Nosebleed is about my journey coming to terms with one of the biggest failures in my life: when my father died, I failed to do anything to honor his life. I hope the play gives the audience a chance to reflect on their own relationships and offers them some space for forgiveness."

**The Nosebleed** runs from March 31 - April 23 with performances Wednesday to Friday at 8 pm, and Saturday at 3 pm and 8 pm (except April 1, single performance), and Sunday at 2 pm and 7 pm (except April 2 & 9, single performance).

There are Pay-What-You-Will preview performances on March 31 and April 1. The official Opening Night is Monday, April 3.

  interpreters placed inside the theatre who translate what the actors are saying and
  expressing to the audience.

- Open Captioned performances on April 12 (8 pm) and April 13 (8 pm) which feature permanently visible, on-screen text description that displays dialogue, identifies speakers and describes other relevant sounds

## **ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT**

AYA OGAWA (Playwright, Director) They/Them AYA OGAWA is a Brooklyn-based playwright,

director, performer, and translator whose work reflects an international viewpoint and utilizes the stage as a space for exploring cultural identity, displacement, and other facets of the immigrant experience. Cumulatively, all aspects of their artistic practice synthesize their work as an artistic and cultural ambassador, building bridges across cultures to create meaningful exchange amongst artists, theaters and audiences both in the U.S. and in Asia. They challenge traditional notions of the American aesthetic and identity by creating performances infused with a multiplicity of perspectives and languages, and by incorporating influences from outside the U.S. – of style, form, and content. As a theater-maker, they frequently use a collaborative creative process with performers and designers and push the form with an eye not only on spoken text, but physicality, musicality, and interactivity.
